HOA Board Message

MARK YOUR CALENDARS; 2024 ANNUAL HOMEOWNER MEETING IS WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 20, STARTING AT 3 P.M. IN THE CLUBHOUSE.

Recently it's come to my attention that comments are coming in from residents such as 'I didn't know I lived in an HOA'. When we purchase our homes (single family or condominium) in the King City Highlands, we are given the set of governing documents and agree to abide by them to own a home or live here. Ignorance of the rules are not an excuse. The HOA has authority to implement fines if necessary (we haven't done that once in the 6 years I've been on the Board – we've always found a way to work together). An article further in the newsletter talks about where to find them if they are not at hand. So, PLEASE, if you are selling a home in the Highlands, ensure your realtor understands that this is a 55+ homeowners association and there are governing documents.

Speaking of rules; the political season is upon us again. All signs are prohibited in the Highlands other than 'For Sale' or estate sales.

It's not too early to mark out the **Wednesday, November 20, Annual Homeowner Meeting starting at 3 p.m.** CMI will send out ballots and meeting materials prior to the meeting. The annual meeting agenda includes voting for HOA board members. *If you are considering applying for a board member position, applications are due no later than noon, Monday, October 21. Applications are available in the office.*

Good news; the 2024 Reserve Study was recently delivered. This document maintains an inventory of all Highlands assets, things like the clubhouse, brick walls, clock tower, walking paths, everything inside the clubhouse, among many others. It looks at the typical useful life of the assets then creates a timeline up to 30 years out to maintain, repair, or replace an asset. In return, that timeline estimates the amount of Reserve Funds that may be needed at that point in time (including estimated inflation rates). The good news; at this point in time it appears our reserve fund growth matches the projected needs very, very well. A testament to the committees and chairs for continued oversight of maintenance and replacement when needed.

Highland Park Condominium Board Message

I want to give a shout out to John Beck for the job he does keeping our recycle and garbage sorted. This is a great service he provides for our community. John sent an email the other day sharing how we can recycle batteries. If you want to recycle dead batteries, first put them in a zip lock bag then place them in the red box at the clubhouse trash area or put them in either the red or yellow box in our trash area and John will transport them to the box at the clubhouse. Again, thank you John. You are appreciated.

Well, the news is out. As you know this is budget time of the year. Our finance, reserve and maintenance committee has been working diligently this past year on our finances. First, we got the shock of the insurance premium being raised far beyond what we were expecting. Then this last month we received another unexpected report on the condition of our roofs which was another shock. At last night's Board meeting we had Josh from Woodstock Construction come and give us a very comprehensive report that included visual power point. He broke the community down into four categories. Group A: Bldgs 1,2,3,4,5,19, 20 and 21. These would have a 10 year life expectancy with regular ongoing maintenance. Group B & C Bldgs 6,7,8,18,11,12, and 13 needs ongoing maintenance which will extend the life probably for less than 10 years; and Group D: 9,10,14,15,16, and 17 need immediate replacement. He did an excellent job of showing us why and answered all questions. The association has the money in this year's budget for the maintenance which will begin right

away. The Board has asked CMI to get three proposals for those roofs that need replacement. The vendor will be selected at the next Board meeting. Here is what this means to us as property owners: Our 2025 monthly fees are going to be \$525.00. When we get the proposal for the roof replacement there will be another additional fee of approximately \$235.00/mo. This figure is to give you an approximate idea of what to expect but will not be firmed up until we receive the other two proposals. This additional fee is for one year to pay for the roof replacements. Our Treasurer, Janis Oyama, did a magnificent job of clearly spelling out everything that goes into coming up with the monthly fees. Again, everyone was encouraged to express themselves as this was a blow to all of us property owners.

I am very much encouraging residents to get involved in our community. We have three Board positions that are coming up at the end of the year. If you are interested in running for the Board, please fill out an application and/or let a Board member know you are interested. It really does not take that much of your time. One other thing. I encourage everyone to read their governing documents. If you are new in our community, it clearly states the rules and regulations which comes in very handy when you are considering renovation etc. When you purchase you own from the inside walls in. The patios and decks are owned by the Association and the property owner has restricted use. You do not have a say on if or when maintenance is done. It is your responsibility to clear your deck for the work to be done. You receive this paperwork when you purchase. You can also find it in the portal. I hope this helps brings clarity. Be safe.

If you plan to do any exterior work on your home or yard, please consult the ALC Manual (found at highlands55.org) for the rules and guidelines around roofs, paint colors, plantings, etc., and submit an application to the ALC for review prior to proceeding with any work.

Also note that your HOA dues include Xfinity preferred cable + Max + Cinemax + two cable boxes. The Xfinity Bulk Services number is on page 5 of the HOA directory. Please let them know that you're a resident of the Highlands to get these services at no cost. The HOA dues do not include your landline phone, internet access, DVR or any channels other than those noted above.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee presented a draft budget for 2025 at the September Town Hall meeting. Feedback from that meeting will be reviewed and incorporated into the budget, and the proposed 2025 budget will be presented at the October Town Hall and Board meeting. Once approved by the Board, the budget will be sent to CMI so we're ready for 2025.

CAREGIVER SUPPORT GROUP

Are you an unpaid family or friend providing support to your spouse, neighbor, parent, or friend? Join us for this free 90 minute group to support family and friends caregiving! We understand that caregiving is rewarding and it can also be tiring and frustrating. We welcome you to come and spend a little time with others who “get it”. Share your story, get support, and learn ideas to help you provide care! Participation or sharing of your story or experiences is optional. This support group is open to anyone in Washington County who is unpaid and caring for someone over the age of 60 or any age with a dementia related diagnosis. Offered through the Washington County Family Caregiver Support Program and funded through the Older Americans Act.

The group meets on the second Monday of each month from 1:00-2:30 pm. I have also posted a flier on the clubhouse bulletin board describing their services. The next meeting is scheduled for October 14th from 1:00-2:30 pm in the card room. Past attendees have made lifelong friendships while sharing their experiences. In the past, they have expressed their gratitude that there is a place for this type of support.

Jennifer Morris, the meeting Facilitator, is a Licensed Professional Counselor, registered with the OBLPCT (Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists). She has lived in Oregon all her life, attending Portland State University for her undergraduate degree (MA in Psychology), and graduating in 2008 from Lewis and Clark University with a Master of Arts in Counseling. She has been counseling adults for over 12 years on issues ranging from dealing with life changes and stressors to anxiety, depression and other mood disorders to major mental illness. She especially enjoys working with people on aging issues and caregiving issues.

Attendance is designed for caregivers only and, at this time, there is a limit of twelve attendees per meeting. To secure your attendance, you need to RSVP by calling Jennifer Morris, the Facilitator, at 503.720.4482. Drop-ins will be welcomed but RSVP'ing is preferred.

For all new residents and a reminder for those who have lived here for a while:

Each street in our Highlands has a "Watch Captain". Captains are available to answer questions residents may have of the neighborhood. They will be vigilant for unusual happenings on your street and will monitor activity when residents are gone for extended periods of time. They will check in with residents if there is a lack of activity around a house (newspapers not being picked up or other signs that a resident might need some help). Watch Captains are here to help and are appreciated for their "eyes on our neighborhood" to continue to keep it safe and welcoming. There is a map on the hallway bulletin board in the Clubhouse that lists who the captains are for your area. Please check it out.

I can't stress enough how important it is to have watch captains watching out for you, your home and your street surroundings. They are an integral part of our community in keeping everyone on our streets extra safe. Our whole community does a great job helping each other out and watching out for each other. Condo Neighborhood Watch

Our September CNW meeting went well. We got a lot discussed in 45 minutes. Many Captains went home, after our meeting, but many lingered to talk with old friends, they hadn't seen in awhile.

The big topic at our meeting was a need to have more than one emergency contact person on our Emergency Contact Forms. And more importantly more ways to contact them, via home phone, cell phone, email, or text. And please keep that information current.

Both the Neighborhood Watch teams for the houses and condos use the same form for their Captain's folder. (Yes, we have two different groups here in the Highlands). A revised form may be in our future. In the meantime Captains please write that additional needed information anywhere you can on the present form we have. Owners please let your watch captain know of any changes, so they can note it on your emergency contact form.

All our condo entryways have a key pad for entry. Each entryway has a different code. If the battery in that key pad fails, we were each given a regular key to unlock that entryway door. Make sure you have that key with you. If a new owners was not given that key at closing, they may ask one of their fellow entryway neighbors, to copy their key, at the new residence expense. Our King City Safeway has a key machine, I have used it. It cost less than \$10.00.

And of course I brought up the need for water leak detectors by your hot water heater, dishwasher, washer/dryer and toilets. They are inexpensive and worth their weight in gold, for the headaches they prevent.

We have new captains in some of our buildings. Take note of the new list posted on the sign up sheet wall, by the clubhouse kitchen. If anyone is interested in becoming a CNW captain, please let me know. I've been one here, for 20 years. Try it, you'll like it.
