# **HOA Board Message**

Wow, September 1st. Can it be almost Autumn already?

I had the occasion recently to sit in on and participate in a very interesting meeting. This was a gathering of ALC members, to discuss what the 2026 Landscape Maintenance Contract would look like. At that point in time, the ALC had solicited and then was evaluating proposals from three different service providers. One was from our current partner, Teufel Landscaping, but the other two were from new companies; one had no history with our HOA at all, the other hadn't done business with our Association for quite a few years. The discussion, for the most part, really wasn't about the potential cost -- despite the effect that the cost of the contract has on the HOA's annual fee. The landscape maintenance contract is paid for out of the Operations side of the budget (10-7675, Master Landscape Maintenance Contract). For 2025, our contract with Teufel costs the HOA \$3,471/month (\$41,652/year). That comes out to a share of \$130.57/year for each and every one of our 319 Association members. This commitment to this one service provider partner, then, is the second largest of ALL of the HOA's Ops budget line items, second only to the budget for our cable TV services with Comcast. So, yeah, this was an important discussion. Rather than the overall cost, then, the discussion focused on the quality of the service we thought we were getting from Teufel, and whether that service/those services were what we thought we had asked for in the previous contract negotiations. As it turns out, there may well have been miscommunications on BOTH sides. The ALC members (and, yes, I'm still a member of the ALC) lamented over the considerable amount of churn in the Teufel personnel assigned to the Highlands, as well as the problems we've had in getting invoices in a timely fashion. We also discussed, at length, the specific landscape maintenance and additional services we request from time to time -- not least of which are repair services related to our aging irrigation system.

What this all comes down to, I believe (and what I shared with my fellow ALC members) is the need for effective communication. If we aren't happy with something one of our service providers is doing (or not doing), we need to tell them, work with them, and work towards a resolution. Changing to a new landscape maintenance company is very difficult. The Highlands has a rather complex environment; and I know, from past experiences, it can take months for a new landscape contractor to figure out that the areas outside the brick walls, including all up and down 131st Avenue and Beef Bend Road, are all HOA spaces that need their attention. Since I've been with the ALC, we've had three different landscape services partners, and we've had problems with all three.

This was a very interesting discussion. I feel that the participants covered a tremendous amount of ground, and very effectively developed future discussion points to be worked out with Teufel's representatives. For myself, I don't believe in perfection. I don't believe such a condition is attainable, in the first place, and my idea of what's "perfect" could be completely different from your idea. The whole point of the discussion was to

collectively figure out what was best for King City Highlands Homeowners Association, and that requires the perspectives and contributions that multiple volunteers bring to the table. One person can't do this alone; it takes a team.

Folks, there's another serious topic I'd like you to think about. This year, for the HOA's Board ofDirectors, there are two seats eligible for election. If you've been here in the Highlands for a few years, or are brand-new to our community, please consider joining our Board (or one of our committees). There will ALWAYS be an open seat available to anyone wanting to share their perspective and life experiences with the Highlands. More details about the Board election will be forthcoming in the future -- and we'd love to have you join us. Thank you, Highlanders. # Architecture & Landscape Committee

Highlanders,

Drainage work in both the central and lower greenways is complete. French drains were cleared of mud and organic material. In the case of the central greenway, arborvitae roots found their way into the pipes and had to be manually extracted. We expect to see improved management of runoff as we approach the rainy season.

Our project to replace seven sidewalk panels in front of the clubhouse has been pushed back to late August/early September. The contractor's current project has expanded in scope resulting in ours being delayed. Permits have been secured so work will begin as soon as possible.

Budget time is just around the corner and we are eyeing 2026 projects. We have developed a preliminary list of infrastructure maintenance and improvement proposals for which we will be seeking estimates to bake into the budget. Including sidewalk and pathway safety and brick wall integrity to name a few. Also factoring landscape contractor costs and associated irrigation, plant and tree maintenance among others.

Architectural and landscape applications continue to flow into the ALC inbox. Home and yard upgrades plentiful this time of year as residents prepare for fall and winter. We've processed applications for house painting, storm door replacement and landscape changes to name a few examples.
