HOA Board Message

Oh my gosh, as I write this, autumn is just 19 hours away! I don't know about you, but this year has been a bit of a blur... We HAVE had a lot going on. As always, our Highlands community has seen a series of wonderful community-wide Special Events in our Clubhouse, including extending special greetings to several dozen new residents. The Committees (Clubhouse Maintenance, Clubhouse Interiors, the Architecture and Landscape Committee and others) have all been busy with their respective areas of responsibility, keeping the Highlands -- both inside the clubhouse and outside in the common areas -- looking beautiful. As we approach Fall, we've turned our attention to the HOA's 2026 budget, and the Finance Committee is fully engaged in that effort. Never a dull moment!

There is, however, the need for some new perspectives from time to time. Our committees are all made up of volunteers, Highlands' residents, who commit their time and share their life experiences to help accomplish what needs to get done. The Architecture & Landscape Committee is a great example. The ALC has nine members, some of whom have been on the committee for more than ten years! Not that those long-serving members are going to be leaving any time soon (as far as I know), but there is ALWAYS a need for new voices. We all bring our experiences, passion and commitment with us when we volunteer -- and the ALC is a critical collection of people, with a wide array of responsibilities. Our HOA has been very fortunate to have people step up and participate in the ALC. When an Association's "landscape and architectural review committee" (or whatever they might call it) fails, the tasks that the committee was responsible for must still get done. An Association may have no other choice but to hire an outside professional landscape manager -- and, as you can imagine, those folks don't come cheap. I wrote about this very issue a few months ago, and now this nightmare has come true for one of our neighboring Homeowners Associations: you need only look to the east, where King City Civic Association is facing a very expensive challenge to replace their version of the ALC. With

costs for an outside landscape manager in the \$60,000- \$80,000 range, the cost to each Highlands homeowner would be somewhere between \$188-\$250/year. Please, consider stepping up and joining the ALC; if you're interested, contact Judy Baese, at 503-598-0298.

Similarly, another bunch of volunteers can be found on the HOA's Board of Directors. The five directors commit to a term of two years. This year, there are two Director seats up for election. Again, our Association receives wonderful benefits from the life experiences that residents bring with them to our community. The skill sets that we've developed in our professional and personal lives have enormous value, and joining the Board is a wonderful way to learn more about your neighbors and your community (as well as helping to keep those skills sharp!). Architecture & Landscape Committee

So far this year, the ALC architecture and landscape coordinators have processed 48 residential projects. Our procedure includes ensuring the applications are properly filled out. Then, when appropriate, consulting with residents to fully understand the project scope. The coordinators ensure the project meets the ALC guidelines and presents the application to the full committee for review and vote. Residents are advised accordingly.

The timeline is generally a few days. We ask residents to keep this in mind when planning and scheduling projects. Please be mindful all ALC members are volunteers. Donating their time and effort to community support. Respecting our volunteers and the process is appreciated.

Speaking of volunteers, we need two and perhaps three new committee members. No experience is necessary. Just bring your lifetime of skills and enthusiasm to contribute to the Highlands. We appreciate new perspectives. Precise roles are TBD as we have some moving parts. However, we do have a need for an irrigation coordinator. This involves managing the irrigation system from spring activation to fall shutdown. Including monitoring the turf and plant beds for watering effectiveness. Also, partnering with our landscape contractor for any needed repairs.

Now that fall has arrived Pacific Landscaping will be re-focusing their energies to spraying for weeds, leaf removal, cutting back on irrigation on turf and shutting off irrigation to beds when possible and then shutting down the irrigation and drain the system when needed. They will also be reducing the mowing to 2 times per month. Hopefully, the bent grass is coming back to life and the lawns will be green again this winter. Plus, maybe we can get some re-seeding done in areas where the lawn has died.

September the pruning got done and the property looks really neat and tidy!

The Committee is planning to have a **Planting Day** with Pacific in October where we will transplant and/or plant new shrubs around the property. Captains are available to answer questions residents may have of the neighborhood. They will be vigilant for unusual happenings on your street and will monitor activity when residents are gone for extended periods of time. They will check in with residents if there is a lack of activity around a house (newspapers not being picked up or other signs that a resident might need some help). Watch Captains are here to help and are appreciated for their "eyes on our neighborhood" to continue to keep it safe and welcoming. There is a map on the hallway bulletin board in the Clubhouse that lists who the captains are for your area. Please check it out.

I can't stress enough how important it is to have watch captains watching out for you, your home and your street surroundings. They are an integral part of our community in keeping everyone on our streets extra safe. Our whole community does a great job helping each other out and watching out for each other. Condo Neighborhood Watch

So, what is Neighborhood Watch?

Neighborhood Watch is a nationwide crime prevention initiative formed in 1973. Citizen volunteers focus on crime prevention by being the eyes and the ears of their community. Neighborhood Watch is managed by the National Sheriff's Department Association.

We volunteers do not carry weapons, detain or search suspicious people in our neighborhood. We are not the police. Basically, we observe and report suspicious activities or criminal behavior to the police. We share a common goal of making our community a safer place and to bring community members together to prevent crime and vandalism. In this community of over 55-year-old residents, we watch out for each other. As a Neighborhood Watch Captain, we belong to a national organization sanctioned by our HOA, the Sheriff's Department and the King City Police Department. We are the eyes and ears of the Highlands.

Please report any suspicious activity, porch pirates, car or garage tampering to your building captain or to me. But remember, if you are in need of emergency services call 911. We are always looking for more caring folks to join our ranks as Neighborhood Watch Captains.

Reserve Studies – What Are They and Why Do We Need Them?

Reserve Studies (Study) are mandated by Oregon State for homeowner and condominium owner associations such as; our King City Homeowners Association (KCHOA) and our Highland Park Condominium Association (HPCA, also referred to as the Condo Owners Association, COA). These studies identify all community-owned assets. For KCHOA that includes the clubhouse (interior/exterior), walking paths, sections of sidewalks, and greenspace among many other things; for the COA that includes all the building exteriors, landscaping, parking lots and garages, plumbing, etc.

For every asset, the Study considers the life expectancy in any current condition, projected estimate of cost to maintain, replace or repair, for periods between one and thirty years. In turn, those projected costs are considered for each year's association budget. For instance, the clubhouse has five air conditioners. Each one is expensive, so it's important to know when each one was installed, what is the projected useful life, and how much should be available at the end of the lifespan to replace it. Considering the number of assets owned by each association, there is a constant need to look at potential upcoming costs each year across the spectrum of assets.

What is the relationship between the Study and the Reserve Fund (Fund) we all pay into? The Fund is established to collect enough monies to pay for the ongoing maintenance, repairs, or replacement of Study assets. Again, the Study looks out between one and thirty years to project potential expenses. The Fund intends to collect sufficient monies to address those expenses in the near- and far-term. Those savings are similar to knowing your car needs a significant repair. If you know that ahead of time, you can save and be prepared to pay for it when it comes due. The Fund is that savings account.

The Fund also should have sufficient monies should an unexpected structural need occur. For instance, recent repairs to the clubhouse alarm system needed repair. It wasn't projected, but KCHOA had sufficient funds available to address the need.

How are monies collected for the Fund(s)? For KCHOA – which every property owner; single family home or condominium owner, it includes 5% of the annual fee plus 1% of all living unit sales. In addition, COA property owners collect .5% of condominium living unit sales plus the monthly homeowner dues collected as contributions to COA's Fund (currently about \$282/month). The ultimate goal for the Fund is to never need to incur an annual assessment for some maintenance, repair, or replacement of an asset. The risks of underfunding could cause the need for a special assessment, a bank loan, or deferred maintenance. Underfunding may also impact the ability to obtain insurance or be a consideration in a loan for living unit sale or for an owner.

Every living unit owner has the right (and dare I say responsibility) to review the Study and Fund to understand the financial position of KCHOA and COA. The Study for both is in the library Reference shelf, and the Fund is part of both KCHOA and COA annual budget which every owner may participate in the annual development process.
